

Iowa's Economy – What's Happening?

Iowa's ag economy is slowing down

- Commodity prices lower than last year
- Livestock prices coming down
- Strong dollar, weak Asian economies having an impact
- Ag-related industries seeing reduced demand, layoffs

Leading Economic Indicator Index Remains Down

• Dept. of Revenue measure has fallen every month this year

Sales Tax Revenue Not Growing As Projected

- March REC called for 5% sales tax growth; currently at 1.14%
- Economic Development incentives being cashed in
- People not spending as much

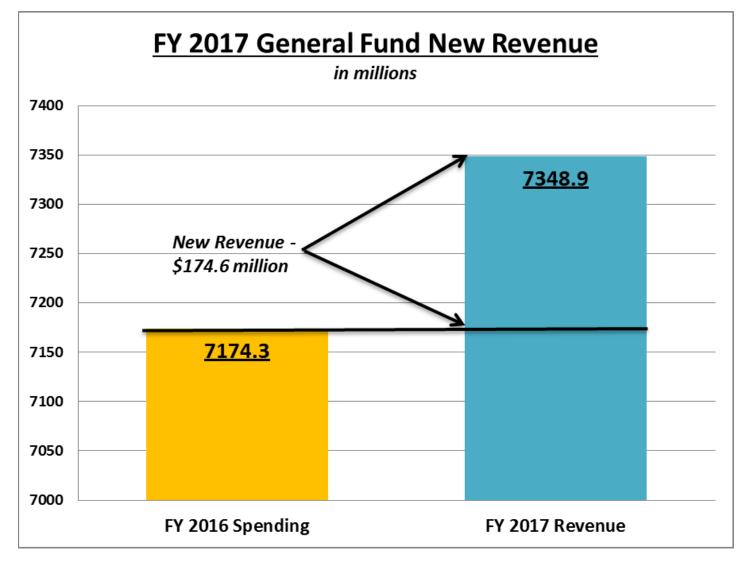

What does this mean?



LSA FY 2017 Projection

Built-in Changes:

LSA projects FY 2017 built-in increases totaling **\$195 million**, including:

- Teacher Leadership **\$53.5 million** (final year of implementation)
- Commercial Property Tax Relief Credit \$25 million
- Medicaid \$65 million (includes savings from Modernization)
- Health & Wellness Program **\$25 million** (first year of state funding)
- REAP **\$20 million** (to be funded by GF according to lowa Code)
- High-need Schools assistance **\$10 million**

Anticipated Increases:

LSA projects other FY 2017 adjustments totaling **\$74.1 million**, including:

- Salary Adjustment \$68.6 million
- DOC Hepatitis C drug costs **\$1.3 million**
- Other Justice Systems Issues \$4 million

LSA FY 2017 Projection – What's Not Included

- Increase in Supplemental State Aid for Schools
- Additional funding for Regents universities

BOR request is \$49.2 million increase

- Additional funding for Community Colleges Expected request to be \$10 million increase
- Additional funding for Medicaid provider rate increases
- Additional cost of complying with new federal child care requirements

Initial estimate is \$8 million, pending release of federal regulations

 Technology Reinvestment Fund appropriation coming from GF, not RIIF

Code calls for \$17.5 million, spent \$10.8 million in FY 16

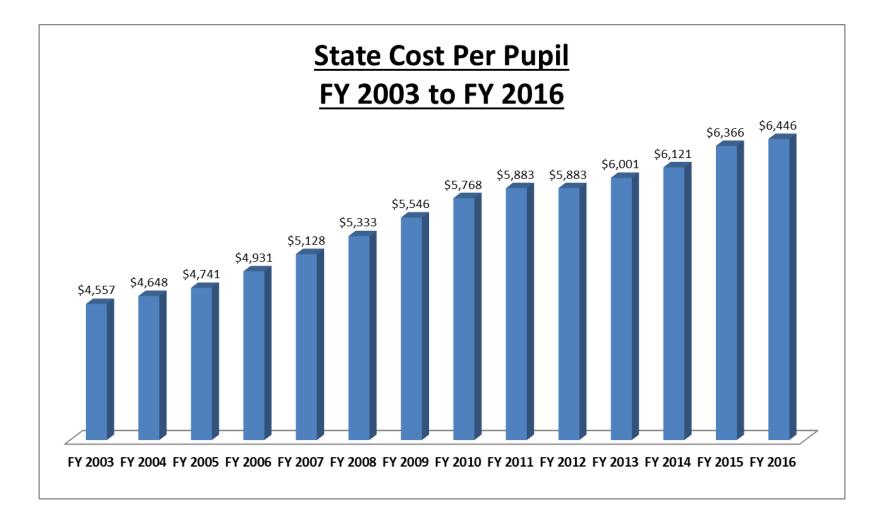
Total Per Pupil Spending

US Average - \$10,700 Iowa - **\$10,313**

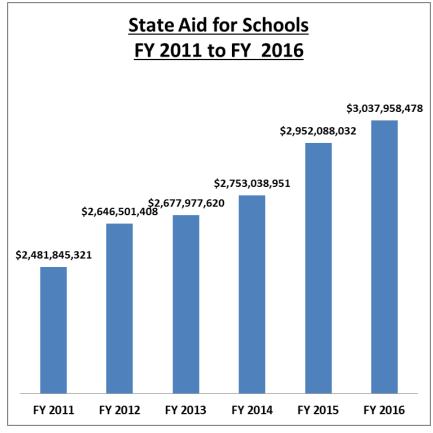
Iowa ranks 27th

- Total \$505.8 million + \$57 million*

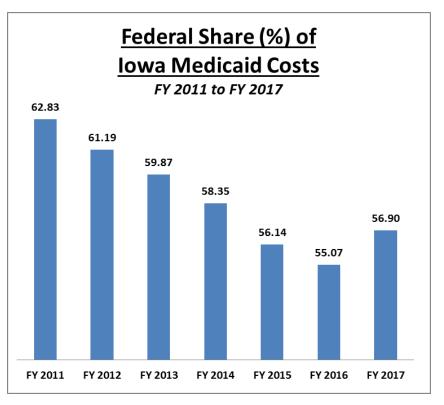

Health Care Programs Growing Faster

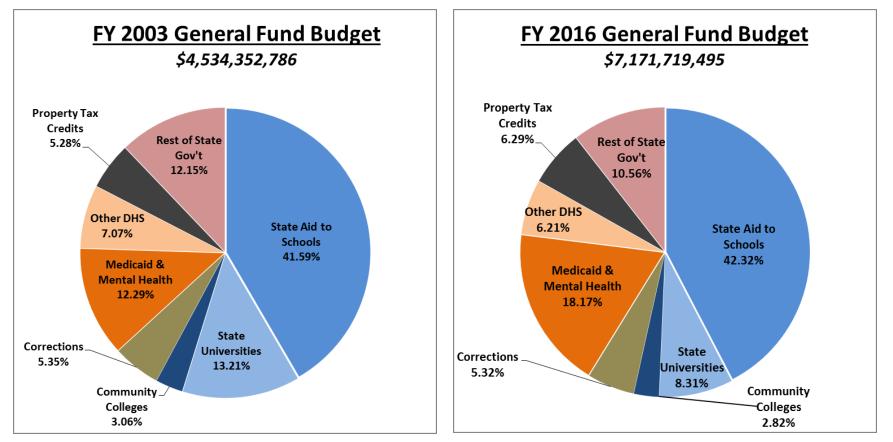

In 2003, 1 out of 11 lowans were covered by a DHS health care program. Today, that number is <u>1 out of 5 lowans.</u>



The drop in Federal Medicaid match rate meant Iowa spent an additional \$270 million on Medicaid in FY 2016.

How the Growth in Health Care Costs is Impacting Iowa's Budget



While Medicaid's share of the State Budget has grown significantly, it is clear that State Aid for schools has been protected by the Legislature.

2015-2016 Budgeting Principles

In these uncertain times, House Republicans are committed to these principles to produce a balanced and sustainable state budget:
